## August School Re-entry-Staggered Start

St. Patrick's School will be continuing with the 'staggered start', that was implemented last year, during the first two days of school. ## ACADEMIC PROGRAM

The Core Academic Program for Middle School includes:

- English Language Arts
- Mathematics
- Science
- Social Studies
- Religious Studies

Other required courses are:

- Physical Education
- Health

The Career and Skill Development (CSD) courses meet the CTF requirements - Career and Technology Foundations, as set out by Alberta Education. Students have voice and choice in some of the selected courses that will be offered throughout the year.

The school year is divided into 3 terms:

- August 14th through to November 17th
- November 18th through to March 15th
- March 16th through to June 26th

## **Progress Reports and Certificates of Placement**

All progress reports for students in Grades 1 - 9 are available online through Schoology and are not printed off.

- Elementary students will receive a printed copy of their Certificate of Placement on the last day of school. Middle school students will not receive a Certificate of Placement.

## Parent/Student/Teacher Interviews

Our entire teaching community strongly encourages parents/guardians to attend Parent/Student/Teacher Interviews. This year, PTI's for the fall will be held on the evenings of October 25th and 26th for Kindergarten to Grade 9. These interviews will begin at 4:00 pm and end at 7:00 each evening. In the spring, PTI's will be held on the evenings of March 20th and 21st beginning at 4:00 pm and will end at 7:00 pm.

## Parent-Staff Communication

Ongoing communication between home and school is essential to the success of each student's learning and achievement. This can be done in a variety of ways:

- Schoology and PowerSchool
- Email
- Phone calls
- Meetings

Please be advised of the protocols that are adhered to when dealing with parent/guardian concerns:

- Any issue that may arise should first be addressed between the parent/guardian and the teacher directly in order to resolve the problem
- If the issue persists, either party can request facilitation to bring the issue to resolution from administration of the school

## FINAL EXAMS

In Grades 6 and 9, Provincial Achievement Tests (PAT) will be administered in May and June, 2024. Further, Grades 7 and 8 will also shadow the PAT schedule for their teacher administered final exams. All students are expected to write all final exams. A final exam schedule will be shared with students, parents and staff once confirmation from Alberta Education and senior administration.

### HOMEWORK AND ASSESSMENT

Students are expected to complete unfinished classroom assignments as homework. All students are strongly encouraged to do daily home reading. Any student having difficulty keeping up with assignments will be given the opportunity to complete unfinished assignments or complete assessments in the **Student Support Centre.** Teachers are encouraged to communicate with parents/guardians through the email, PowerSchool, phone calls, and/or parent meetings.

Students will not be expected to write any type of assessment (quiz/test/exam) on a Monday. The only exception to this will be during final exams.

#### **DIGITAL Citizenship**

Digital citizenship is the appropriate and responsible behavior with regards to technology use. Digital citizenship should be practiced in every course, throughout the school and at home. It is an ongoing partnership between teachers, students, and parents. Just as teachers build an awareness of the importance of digital citizenship at school, parents build and reinforce these concepts with their children at home. Students need to approach any use of technology with the digital citizenship components in mind.

In such circumstances or in situations of defiance, a student may be referred to administration.

NOTE: Electronic devices (laptops / chrome books may be exempt in some circumstances) are NOT permitted during examinations and their use may result in the student receiving a zero mark.

#### **DAWE CENTER LIBRARY**

We have complete access to the Red Deer Public Library Dawe Branch as our school's Learning Commons. Students will be accessing the Dawe Library on a regular basis to learn more about library access, research, finding a 'good fit' book and more. All students will receive a free library card to access their account online or in person at all Red Deer Public Library locations.

#### **PHYSICAL EDUCATION**

## STUDENT SUPPORT SERVICES

### **COUNSELLING SERVICES**

St. Patrick's uses several different approaches in meeting students' social/emotional needs. One method is the 'teacher as counsellor' which includes two certified teachers, who have obtained their Masters degree, that offer a student general guidance and direction. Our Teacher/Counsellors are not Therapeutic Counsellors and; therefore, do not provide therapy.

At our school, our parents and students have full access to our Family School Enhancement Counsellor (FSEC). Our FSEC can assist in facilitating support both in school as well as in the home. For further inquiries about our counselling services, please call the office at 403 343 3238.

## **Medical Concerns**

Parents, for your child's safety, please make the office staff aware of any medical issues that may affect your children during the school day. Parents or designated contacts will be notified immediately if an emergency arises. Staff are not permitted to provide students with any medication. Student medications must be stored in the office.

\*It is critically important that all emergency contact information is current and up to date. Please ensure that correct phone numbers are on file. Thank you for letting front office personnel know if there are any changes to your personal information.

\*\*Individuals who have allergies or ongoing health issues and who are exhibiting COVID-like symptoms must be tested at least once according to the Alberta Health Services Guidance. This will establish a baseline for the individual. If symptoms change (worsen, additional symptoms, change in baseline) the individual must stay home and be tested and cleared. Schools will track typical symptoms that may be confused for COVID-19 for students in PowerSchool as they would with other medical conditions.

## **School and Transportation Property Damage**

Any student involved in damaging school property or damage done to buses with Red Deer Catholic Regional Schools transportation will be fully responsible for paying for the damage done. ## <u>Theft</u>

Any student involved in theft will be expected to pay for the theft incurred. Other school consequences may be applied that are appropriate to the offence. This also applies to any theft while riding Red Deer Catholic Regional Schools transportation.

## **Supplies And Valuables**

It is strongly suggested that students do not bring valuables to school. All clothing (ie: boots, mitts, coats) and school supplies should be <u>clearly</u> labeled with the child's first and last name. All students are to have a separate pair of indoor shoes which are stored in their classroom.

#### Lost And Found

Items of value that have been found are retained in the office. Clothing and miscellaneous items are kept in a hallway "lost and found". Periodically these items will be displayed for retrieval. Those items not collected will be given away to a charity.

#### **GENERAL INFORMATION**

#### **Attendance**

All students are expected to be on time and attend school as per the Alberta Education Act. Students absent from school without good reason are considered truant. All absentees are checked by telephone from the school. Parents are required to phone the school when their child is ill. Students who are late must check in at the office for a late slip. Late slips must be given to the classroom teacher upon admittance to class.

Chronic truancy and late students will be dealt with according to the Alberta Education Act. Letters indicating truancy will be issued to the parent/guardian of the student not attending. This information will be recorded in the Student Information System. If issues continue with student attendance, a recommendation will be made to the Associate Superintendent of Student Services for a hearing with the Attendance Board.

#### **Field Trips**

Field trips help reinforce classroom materials, bringing lessons to life. School trips give students the opportunity to visualize, experience and discuss information on a subject. Going on field trips offers students a unique cultural learning experience.

## Dress Code

Outer clothing and backpacks are to be stored in lockers during class time. All clothing is to be appropriate and respectful for the classroom. We promote modesty. Outer clothing items with slogans inappropriate to a Catholic school are not permitted. Students' shirts must be long enough to be tucked in. Shorts, dresses and skirts should be no shorter than mid-thigh. All pants must cover undergarments. Hats, hoods on hoodies are only to be worn outside only and NOT in class.

## **School Visitors**

All visitors to the school, including parents/guardians and other guests, must first check in at the front office.

## Bicycles/Rollerblades/Skateboards/Wheelie Shoes

Students may ride bicycles to school provided they are locked up throughout the day in the bicycle racks provided. Students must wear helmets when riding bicycles, rollerblades and skateboards. If riding bikes or skateboards to school—students must dismount and walk when they enter school grounds.

Students may blade to school; however, roller blades are to be removed at the school entrance area and carried into the school.

Wheelie shoes are not permitted in the school at any time.

## **Aerosol Spray Products**

To maintain a safe environment for students with allergies, students are asked to refrain from using aerosol spray products such as deodorants, perfumes and body sprays at the school and instead use stick forms or non-aerosol products when used.
